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Massachusetts Students Selected for United States Senate Youth Program
Students Headed to Washington, D. C. and to Receive \$10,000 College Scholarship

January 16, 2019, Washington, D.C. —The United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) announces that high school students Mr. Michael Charles Alan Mischley and Mr. Shane Christopher Rose will join Senator Elizabeth Warren and Senator Edward Markey in representing Massachusetts in the nation's capital during the 57th annual USSYP Washington Week, to be held March 2 — 9, 2019. Michael Mischley of West Bridgewater and Shane Rose of Dartmouth were selected from among the state's top student leaders to be part of the 104 national student delegation who will also each receive a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate study.

The USSYP was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 and has been sponsored by the Senate and fully funded by The Hearst Foundations since inception. Originally proposed by Senators Kuchel, Mansfield, Dirksen and Humphrey, the impetus for the program as stated in Senate testimony is "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationships of the three branches of government, learn the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and emphasize the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

Each year this extremely competitive merit-based program brings the most outstanding high school students - two from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity - to Washington, D.C. for an intensive week-long study of the federal government and the people who lead it. The overall mission of the program is to help instill within each class of USSYP student delegates more profound knowledge of the American political process and a lifelong commitment to public service. In addition to the program week, The Hearst Foundations provide each student with a \$10,000 undergraduate college scholarship with encouragement to continue coursework in government, history and public affairs. Transportation and all expenses for Washington Week are also provided by The Hearst Foundations; as stipulated in S.Res.324, no government funds are utilized.

Michael Mischley, a senior at West Bridgewater Middle Senior High School, serves as president of the Leo Club, a service organization that works to better both the school and the community through charitable events and service. He is the coordinator of the Wildcat Mentor Program, secretary of State for Boys State, and secretary general of the Model United Nations. Michael is a member of the National Honor Society, National French Honor Society, Environmental Club, Debate Club, and Bridgewater Democratic Town Committee. Michael plans to major in political science and pursue graduate studies in public administration, then run for elected office to help improve the lives of people in the commonwealth.

Shane Rose, a senior at Dartmouth High School, serves as a representative on the Student Council and the Southeast Regional Student Advisory Council. He tutors students and is a volunteer for South Coast Youth Court, a juvenile diversion program. Shane created and leads a student group at school to raise money and awareness for Helping Hands, an organization that supports low income students, and he also plays soccer and tennis. He plans to pursue undergraduate studies in chemical engineering and then go into law or business. Shane is determined to continue involvement in public service and is interested in becoming a state representative.

Chosen as alternates to the 2019 program were Mr. Stephen K. Ailinger, a resident of Norwood, who attends Norwood High School and Mr. Neil N. Pandit, a resident of Burlington, who attends Burlington High School.

Delegates and alternates are selected by the state departments of education nationwide and the District of Columbia and Department of Defense Education Activity, after nomination by teachers and principals. The chief state school officer for each jurisdiction confirms the final selection. This year's Massachusetts delegates and alternates were designated by Mr. Jeffrey C. Riley, Commissioner of Elementary and Secondary Education.

While in Washington the student delegates attend meetings and briefings with senators, members of the House of Representatives, Congressional staff, the president, a justice of the Supreme Court, leaders of cabinet agencies, an ambassador to the United States and senior members of the national media. The students will also tour many of the national monuments and several museums and they will stay at the historic Mayflower Hotel in downtown Washington, D.C.

In addition to outstanding leadership abilities and a strong commitment to volunteer work, the student delegates rank academically in the top one percent of their states among high school juniors and seniors. Now more than 5,700 strong, alumni of the program continue to excel and develop impressive qualities that are often directed toward public service. Among the many distinguished alumni are: Senator Susan Collins, the first alumna to be elected U.S. senator; Senator Cory Gardner, the second alumna to be elected U.S. senator and the first to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives; former New Jersey Governor Chris Christie, the first alumna to be elected governor; former Chief Judge Robert Henry, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit; former Ambassador to West Germany Richard Burt, and former presidential advisors Thomas "Mack" McLarty and Karl Rove. Additional notables include former Lt. Governor of Idaho David Leroy, Provost of Wake Forest University Rogan Kersh, military officers, members of state legislatures, Foreign Service officers, top congressional staff, healthcare providers and other university educators.
