<p>Course Requirements for SEI Stand Alone Course (course approved to be offered to all individuals at your organization, including those within and outside Initial licensure programs)</p>	<p>The SEI Endorsement Stand Alone course requirements have been updated to reflect the enactment of the LOOK Act, the creation of the English Learner Education Vision and Blueprint, and the 2020 WIDA Standards, as well as to increase focus on an asset-based approach to EL Education, culturally and linguistically sustaining practices, and information about EL special populations.</p> <p>The strategies of the Stand Alone course remain unchanged except for the elimination of “Think-pair share,” and a new Appendix A which includes expanded, more detailed and clearly laid out information about the strategy procedures.</p> <p>The number of required readings has been reduced, with several being eliminated and others being replaced with newer editions.</p> <p>This section of the advisory is here <u>only as a reminder of the course and submission requirements</u>.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • See link here to detailed course requirements • See link here for submission requirements

Sheltered English Immersion (SEI) Course Requirements



Course Requirements for SEI Initial Licensure Course(s) (available only to candidates in your initial licensure program)	<p>There are <u>no new requirements</u> for the initial licensure SEI course(s). This section of the advisory is here <u>only as a reminder</u>. If your organization is approved and requires the SEI Stand Alone Course for all candidates in your initial licensure program, this section is not relevant.</p> <p>Course requirements include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• One or two (no more than two courses to ensure that content is not lost or minimized) courses for the SEI Teacher Endorsement and the SEI Administrator Endorsement. The Department recommends one dedicated course wherever possible.• Coursework must address the SEI Subject Matter Knowledge (SMK) Requirements as outlined Regulations, 603 CMR 7.14 (1) and (2) and the SEI Indicators outlined in the Professional Standards for Teachers Guidelines (see pages 4-6). <p>Field Experience:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Field-based experiences can be part of pre-practicum and/or practicum experiences/requirements.
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For purposes of the above referenced requirements, the following definitions of Asynchronous and Synchronous Learning¹ apply:

Asynchronous Learning - Its basic premise is that learning can occur in different times and spaces particular to each learner.

Synchronous Learning - Synchronous learning refers to all types of learning in which learner(s) and instructor(s) are in the same place, at the same time, in order for learning to take place. This includes in-person classes and live online meetings when the whole class or smaller groups get together. In synchronous learning, students usually go through the learning path together, accompanied by their instructor who is able to provide support while students are completing tasks and activities.

Endorsing for the SEI course that is completed through Initial Licensure Coursework

Candidates who complete the SEI requirements through Initial licensure coursework are only endorsed in ELAR for SEI at the point of the Initial teacher endorsement. Candidates are not endorsed for SEI without completion of this Initial coursework.

We are aware that some sponsoring organizations have chosen not to endorse until successful completion of the MTELs. As per our MTEL Use Advisory released in 2023, we recommend sponsoring organizations endorse candidates upon completion of the licensure program requirements.
