The recipient should provide more information on how each of the contracted partners will increase the efficiency of virtual platforms to improve communication and dissemination of CDC's COVID-19 school-based guidance.
- The recipient proposes work that supports professional development and training on the following:
 - o CDC's school-based COVID-19 school-based guidance.

- The recipient will provide webinar training series that would assist physical education and health education teachers in improving remote and distant learning strategies.
- The recipient will train teachers and school staff in Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA).
 School staff will learn how to identify, support and refer for additional help to students that are facing mental health challenges such as stress, anxiety, mental illness in response to COVID-19.
- The recipient will train school and district leaders on best practices for engaging families
 during COVID-19 and school re-entry. The staff will learn strategies for engaging families to
 prepare for re-opening of schools; how to effectively communicate and collaborate with
 parents to implement and integrate state and CDC COVID-19 school-base guidance, and how
 to work with family to support the social emotional and mental wellbeing of student.
- The recipient will provide webinar training series that would assist schools and districts to
 develop systems for supporting adult social emotional learning and wellness, particularly in
 response to the anxiety and stress related to supporting the school health environment to
 maintain a safe and supportive atmosphere due to COVID-19.
- The recipient proposes work that supports technical assistance on the following:
 - The recipient will provide TA to assist out-of-school time programs that seek strategies on implementing social distancing and CDC's school-based COVID-19 guidance.
 - The recipient will provide support to PE teachers and/or youth support coaches to improve physical education, physical activity, and healthy eating while practicing social distancing measures and implementing CDCs school-based COVID-19 guidance.
 - The recipient, through other partnerships, is already addressing how to support the management of students with chronic conditions while practicing social distancing measures and therefore will not be addressing it through this supplemental funding.
 - The recipients will support LEAs and schools with high risk and vulnerable populations by offering TA on implementing CDC's COVID-19 school-based guidance and support student's social and emotional health and wellbeing.
- The recipient provides information related to their plan for tracking, monitoring, and reporting
 progress. The Healthy Schools Team will monitor and evaluate outcomes (the recipient listed eight
 outcomes). In addition, the recipient will work with their CDC project officer through the budget
 year to ensure progress is demonstrated and activities/objectives are achieved, and any barriers are
 addressed.
